The Year 9 Parents' Consultation Evening to support final decision making is on Thursday 13th February and the deadline for submission of their options is the following day on Friday 14th February. The form for students to complete this process will be sent to students directly on their school email.

The school calendar continues to be busy in the lead up to the half term break, particularly with regard to assessments for Year 11 and 13, but also with Year 12 in-lesson assessments taking place over the next week. I would like to take this opportunity to commend all students for the way in which they have approached these assessment and exam pressures and remind them that we are here to help if things don't or haven't gone as planned. There are numerous afterschool sessions, with the Year 11 offer publicised in the regular newsletters from Ms Marlborough, and staff are open to providing as much advice, guidance, feedback and further practice as students need. Staff will obviously approach students where they see need, but I should impress on students and families that we may not always see hidden anxieties and that students should feel confident in asking for help as and when they need it.






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## **Sporting success**
